FROM THE PASTOR—THE ACTS OF THE APOSTLES

As we enter into the remainder of the Easter season, we ought to note the change in the readings we hear at the Sunday Mass. Normally, the schedule is to hear a reading from the Old Testament, a psalm, a reading from the New Testament, followed by a reading from one of the Gospels. Yet, during Easter, we do not hear from the Old Testament, but hear instead from the Acts of the Apostles. What is the significance behind this? Why this change?

We must understand the context and background of this book of the New Testament and the Bible. Acts comes both chronologically and in canonical order after the Gospels. This book, written by Luke (who also wrote the Gospel attributed to him), details the beginnings of the Church, from the Ascension of Jesus to when St. Paul reaches Rome. This time period is dated usually AD 33-62, which means Luke provides for us an account of the first 60 years of the Christian era.

In reading along in this biblical book, we see how the Church grows from the initial community of believers (all Jews from the Roman province of Judea) to its first spread throughout most of the known western world. By the end of Acts, we hear about disciples spreading the Gospel to places in modern-day Syria, Lebanon, Egypt, Turkey, Greece, and even reaching and establishing a community in the heart of the empire in Rome. We see not only the expansion of the Church to these areas, but also the growth in the body of Christ to not only preach to the Jews (who are also an ethnicity besides being a religion) but to include the Gentiles (the non-Jews).

But what does this have to do with Easter? We are called by the Church to recognize and remember the feats that are accomplished only by the power and grace that flows from the mystery of the Resurrection. None of this can occur outside of the triumph of Jesus Christ in the Paschal Mystery: suffering, dying, and rising victorious from death. This proclamation by the Church is also meant to spur us on to emulate the actions of the early Church: to announce the Gospel to all and to draw everyone into the body of Christ which is the Church, to boldly follow the Apostles in calling all to repent and believe.



Let us listen with the ears of our hearts to the inspired words on the Scriptures, especially listening to the Acts of the Apostles. Let us not just be hearers of the Word but also doers and acters of the Word. Let us announce the victory of Christ over sin, Satan, and death to all so that they may merit the rewards of eternal life.
