

### FROM THE PASTOR—THE ANOINTING OF THE SICK

I would like to conclude this brief series on the sacraments by looking at what should be the last sacrament we receive in our earthly lives: the sacrament of the anointing of the sick. With the breakdown of creation caused by sin has come not only death but also sickness and suffering. Christ now only knows this in His divine knowledge but experiences it in His humanity in the Passion, and thus has compassion on us in these moments of frailty. The Lord gives us this sacrament for our time of need and when we are in danger of death.

This sacrament has a few names in English, in particular the older term "extreme unction" or it is sometimes called the "last rites". These names are given because this sacrament is normally tied to the end of our life, when we are preparing to stand before the Just Judge who will judge all that we have done, said, and thought. This is a time fraught with danger, for it is the last opportunity that Satan and his evil legions has of dragging a soul down with them into eternal damnation.

This sacrament uses consecrated olive oil as the matter which helps convey the invisible grace Christ desires to give the soul anointed. Oil has been used throughout history not only as a means of strengthening the body (see confirmation) but also for its healing properties. The oil of the sick is consecrated by the bishop each year at the chrism Mass during Holy Week, along with the oil of catechumens and the sacred chrism (which are used in baptisms and confirmations).

Who can receive this sacrament? Many think that the anointing of the sick is reserved only for the moment of death, and wait until it is too late for the sacrament to help. We must always remember that only the living can receive sacraments; with death comes the separation of body and soul and the loss of any additional grace to come. The Church calls for people to receive this anointing not only in danger of death but when serious illness occurs or even for the benefit of the elderly. In fact, this sacrament can be received with frequency if the conditions continue or grow



worse. We should never delay in calling a priest to come and give a sick person this sacrament, hence why the Church ties to staff hospitals with priest chaplains available at a moment's notice. Without this sacrament, we stand unprepared for the hour of death. But with this sacrament comes not only the remission of our sins (similar to confession) but also the grace to endure our sufferings and to prepare for that most unavoidable moment: when we must pass from this mortal coil.

If you know someone who needs or wants to be anointed, please contact me and I will visit them. Do not delay in receiving the anointing of Christ the Divine Physician so that you may be ready to meet Christ the Judge when your time comes.
