

FROM THE PASTOR – ON DISTRIBUTING THE PRECIOUS BLOOD

With the recent reading of the Bread of Life Discourse in the Gospel of John over the past few weeks, we should consider our reception of the Eucharist. We need to be sure we are receiving the Eucharist worthily and well for it to truly be the Bread of Life for us. We know about the reception of the Sacred Host from the priest, but what of the Precious Blood?

There has emerged very recently the optional practice of the reception of both species: not only the Sacred Host but the Precious Blood as well. This was reintroduced into the Latin (Roman) Rite in the 1970s after the Second Vatican Council as an option for parishes. The coronavirus pandemic saw an extended pause in this practice, but now our bishop has permitted this once again. For the record, I am not planning on reintroducing the distribution of the Precious Blood via separate chalices. Here are some of my reasons:

- Many who receive both say that they feel that they receive more of Jesus than the more traditional way. This is actually an error against our Catholic faith, which holds that it is the same Jesus really and truly present and living in BOTH species (as emphasized by the Council of Trent against the Protestants). We do not get "more Jesus" by receiving both species. How can you have more of the infinite?
- The distribution of the Precious Blood via separate chalices is far more susceptible to spreading germs than the distribution of the Sacred Hosts. Not only during the coronavirus pandemic, but also during major flu seasons, this distribution has been eliminated for the safety of the congregation and the priest celebrant. If there will be so much fluctuation in the health of our people, we should be more generally cautious in our practices.
- There can emerge (reflective perhaps of the first point above) in the minds and hearts of some who receive both species a form of spiritual pride. They may think to themselves that they are better than others because they receive both whereas many only receive the Sacred Host. Our reception of Holy Communion should never lead to pride but humility before God.

While we may not receive the Precious Blood in an individuated way at our parish, we are still receiving the full Christ in the Eucharist. You are not denied anything if you do not partake of the chalice. We believe Jesus gives Himself totally in the Eucharist, and just as a living body has both body and blood, so too does the Eucharist in which the living Christ is given to us have His full Body and Blood. Let us partake of the Eucharist well so that we may have not only the words but the fullness of everlasting life beginning here and opening up unto eternity.
