

## FROM THE PASTOR—QUEEN OF HEAVEN

Last week we celebrated the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the end of her life on earth. This feast is normally concluded a week later with the celebration of Mary as Queen of Heaven and Earth on August 22. This year it is impeded with the regular Sunday celebration, but it is still good to look at what this celebration means for Mary and for us.

We acclaim Jesus as the King of the universe in every part of our faith: not only celebrating it on the last Sunday of the liturgical year but throughout the Scriptures and in much of the sacred liturgy. What does it mean to call Mary "Queen" though? Isn't this normally associated with the wife of a king? This latter question is not necessarily what we mean when we acclaim Mary as Queen.

There is a tradition in many regal circles, especially in the biblical ancient Israelite kingdom's hierarchy, of the mother of the king being called the Queen or Queen Mother and becoming second in authority only to the king himself. Solomon the son and heir of David was famous for making his mother Bathsheba important in his kingdom (1 Kings 2:20). Many kings placed their trust in their mother, and it is no different between our Lord and our Lady. We can even find a biblical precedent for this in the Book of Revelation, when John sees a woman "clothed with the sun, ... and on her head a crown of twelve stars" (Rev. 12:1), an image often associated with Mary in biblical interpretation and commentary.

Mary receives this position of honor and authority not merely for her sake as a reward for her fidelity and humility, but for our sake as well. Standing at the right hand of her Son as he rules over all things, she is able to win for us anything we need or desire. If Jesus has placed His mother at His right, it is for our benefit. We should never hesitate to give her our wants, our desires, our needs, because she knows how best to present them to the King and to beseech on our behalf for all things necessary for our salvation.

This celebration of Mary as Queen also reminds us of what awaits us if we are faithful and humble before the King: that we too shall be crowned as kings co-reigning with Christ forever. If we are truly united to Jesus in eternity, then we shall share in everything He has, including His kingship. Our King Himself tells us this in the Book of Revelation when He says: "Be faithful even to the point of death, and I will give you the crown of life." (Rev. 2:10) All who strive willfully to avoid sin and be holy will share with the One who has already walked this life and earned the crown of victory.

Let us pray to our Queen that we may receive from her Son all we need to become holy in this life and be worthy to share with Him, with her, and with all the saints the crown of eternal life.
