FROM THE PASTOR—STUDY RESOURCES

What are some things we can do to grow in our knowledge of our Catholic faith? In our modern world, with so many ways of getting material to us, it can be quite bewildering to know what to trust and where to go. I have put together this little list of resources that I have seen be very helpful for so many people and are reliable sources for studying our faith.

PRINT RESOURCES

- *The Catechism of the Catholic Church*—the most reliable work to study the faith since it is published by the Vatican itself! This work contains a very good summary of the basic tenets and beliefs of Catholicism for new members or even for longtime attendees. It can in some places get too deep, but there is no better place to go to begin learning about any religious matter.
- *Catholicism and Fundamentalism* by Karl Keating—a classic work on defending the Catholic faith against the charges of Protestants, especially fundamentalist groups such as extreme Baptists; goes over topics such as faith vs works and the place of Scripture in the Church
- *The One Minute Apologist* by Dave Armstrong—A good short work which provides quick answers to many of the objections raised by other Christians
- *The National Catholic Register*—regular newspaper published not only with current Church news but also provides many regular discussions and articles on matters of faith and morals (also available online)

ONLINE RESOURCES

- *Formed.org*—website with regular series on various topics, including *Symbolon*-useful for people approaching or entering the Church (membership required)
- *WordOnFire.org*—website started by Bishop Robert Barron with regular series, videos, and articles released on latest issues along with the regular doctrines and beliefs
- *CatholicProductions.com*—a great Catholic bible study website that offers material for studying the weekly readings along with the major parts of the Bible

These are just a few of the things you can find, but they are some of the most reliable that I can promote. Do take advantage of them and learn more about your faith. Let us not settle for the minimum but strive to understand as best as we can so that we may live our faith to the fullest.
