

TRIDUUM FOR CORONAVIRUS

Bishop Foys has called upon all the faithful of our diocese to offer up prayers and fasting and penances to alleviate the coronavirus on the days of August 20-22. We are all urged to pray and offer fastings and penances for an end to the coronavirus during these days.



FROM THE PASTOR – THE MARIAN DOGMAS

We celebrate today one of the greatest days in the liturgical year: the annual commemoration of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary body and soul into Heaven. While the actual feast is August 15, it seems inappropriate to let this day not be celebrated by our parish which began with St. Mary of the Assumption Church. This gives us an opportunity to consider the place of Mary in the beliefs and doctrine of our faith.

In the hierarchy of doctrine in the Catholic Church, the highest ranking is called a dogma. A dogma is a truth appertaining to faith or morals, revealed by God, transmitted from the Apostles in the Scriptures or by tradition, and proposed by the Church for the acceptance of the faithful. There are four major dogmas concerning the Blessed Virgin Mary.

- Immaculate Conception Bl. Pope Pius IX defined in 1854 the belief that Mary, by a singular privilege of God, was conceived in the womb of her mother St. Anne without the stain of original sin. This is not to be confused with the conception and birth of Jesus.
- II) Mother of God The Council of Ephesus in 431 definitively proclaimed that Mary is the mother of God Incarnate in Jesus Christ. This affirms that Jesus is both God and man even while He is in the womb of Mary.
- III) Perpetual Virginity This belief states that Mary both before, during, and after her pregnancy with Jesus remained a virgin inviolate.
- IV) Assumption Pope Pius XII in 1950 defined this belief that Mary at the end of her earthly life was assumed both body and soul by God into eternal life.

Why are all these doctrines and dogmas so important? They are important because they all reflect upon the child of Mary – Jesus Christ, the Savior of the world. To speak of Mary is to speak of Jesus. Anything deficient in our understanding of who Mary is, what she has done, and what God does through her become deficiencies in understanding who Jesus is, what He does, and what God does through Him.

The Catholic Church affirms that Mary is a human being and is not someone to worship like or as a god. However, her unique role in the history of salvation makes her the most praiseworthy human being to ever exist after Jesus. If Mary does not exist, Jesus cannot exist as a human being. If Mary does not say yes to God, Jesus would not be born to save us and open the way of salvation and eternal life.

Let us praise and venerate the Queen assumed into Heaven today, that she who was humble enough to become the Mother of God may be our own spiritual mother watching and caring for us even now in Heaven, so that we may be made worthy to join her in loving and praising the Holy Trinity for all eternity. *Fr.
