

FROM THE PASTOR—THETEN COMMANDMENTS

A new liturgical year gives us an opportunity for a fresh start and to renew our efforts to follow Christ more perfectly. What better way do we have to do so than to strive to understand the basic precepts of Christian living? These are found within the Ten Commandments given by God to Moses on Mt. Sinai after the first Passover of the ancient Israelites. The moral tradition and teaching of the Church is founded upon these commandments as well as the Beatitudes and other teachings of Christ found in the Gospels.

The Catholic division of the Commandments comes from splitting them based upon their primary object: whether God or our neighbor. For each Commandment helps us to live the Two Great Commandments of Christ more perfectly: to love God with our whole heart and whole mind and whole being, and to love our neighbor as ourself. The first 3 listed help us to love God, and the other seven help us to love our neighbor. It is also utilizing sacred numbers, with 3 being the other number symbolizing God (who is a Trinity) and 7 recalling the temporal world with the days of the week. All other divisions are different from how the Church has handed them down and should be disregarded.

Below you will see a traditional list of the Ten Commandments, combining the two accounts in Sacred Scripture (Exodus 20:2-17 and Deuteronomy 5:6-21). Each week for the next few months, this column will look at one commandment, offer a brief commentary, then highlight major sins against that commandment. I hope this will be of great assistance to you as we await the coming of Christ the Just Judge, who shall reckon all our actions according to His divine standard and judge us worthy of Heaven or Hell based on our adherence to that standard. If you have not memorized them already, do so using this list. It is a great aid for confession preparation and to grow in your faith. May we know and observe all that Christ commands of us so that we may not perish, but have eternal life.

A Traditional Catechetical Formula (according to the Catechism of the Catholic Church)

- 1. I am the LORD your God: you shall not have strange Gods before me.
- 2. You shall not take the name of the LORD your God in vain.
- 3. Remember to keep holy the LORD'S Day.
- 4. Honor your father and your mother.
- 5. You shall not kill.
- 6. You shall not commit adultery.
- 7. You shall not steal.
- 8. You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor.
- 9. You shall not covet your neighbor's wife.
- 10. You shall not covet your neighbor's goods.
