

FROM THE PASTOR – THE DATE OF CHRISTMAS

One of the most confounding parts of celebrating Christmas is that it is celebrated on a fixed day. Though the date changes, we celebrate Easter on a Sunday because it is the day of the Resurrection. However, Christmas has always been celebrated on December 25, no matter what day of the week it falls. It can be especially difficult on a year like this year when it is on Monday and we must attend two Masses in two days. What is so special about this date of Dec. 25?

Some will argue that Christmas is celebrated on this date as a replacement for a previously pagan Roman holiday to encourage conversion. There is a weak argument of a celebration called Saturnalia



commemorated on Dec. 17 which sometimes extended for a week to Dec. 23. However, there is no evidence from any of the Church Fathers for establishing this celebration, when there are ample anecdotes about replacing other pagan feasts with Christian ones. If it were true, though, it would be a reminder of the conquest of Christ over all the false ancient "gods" and a sign of His triumph by overtaking the formerly vulgar celebrations with His own days.

We get this date because of the established date for the celebration of Christ's conception and death: March 25. The ancient world knew that it took nine months for a child to be fully developed

from their conception, and our blessed Lord would be no different. But how does this date coincide with His sorrowful death? Early Church theologians did not have a solid record from the Apostles about when the Lord was crucified, but estimated it to happen on March 25th. An ancient Judaic tradition believed that a prophet died on the same day as he was conceived, and the early Fathers adopted this tradition with regards to Christ. So we get the date of December 25 from the date of the conception and death of Christ on March 25.

"Why don't we just move it to Sunday, though?" some may ask. We do seem to be all too willing to move feasts to Sunday because it is convenient. However, the Church holds to the celebration of Christmas on December 25 as a reminder of the intrusion of the Word made flesh into the world. His birth impacts everything. We cannot change this date nor transfer it without losing the understanding of Christ being Lord even at birth. Come and adore Him born on Christmas Day to save you!
