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

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK—MANIFESTATIONS OF GOD: THE HUMAN PERSON

I would like to conclude this series on how God manifests Himself to us by looking at one final means whereby we encounter God, albeit one we rarely acknowledge: the human person. By this term, I do not mean a certain group or type. Every human person is a manifestation of God. If one is human, then they are able to reflect God to us.

This manifestation of God within man happens first because of our particular creation. In Genesis, we hear God speak in a particular way concerning the creation of man: "Then God said, 'Let us make man in our image, after our likeness.'" (Gen 1:26) In each human person is found this image and likeness of God. No matter one's gender, race, color, or other features, we are all created by God and are called to return to God. We are the only creature within the physical cosmos created for our own sake. Everything else was created to reflect God's glory and for our use and benefit, but we are meant to return to God and become like God.

We see this divine image in two main natural gifts: the faculties of reason and free will. We are rational creatures capable not only of communication but of deep thought and prayer. We are also capable of freely choosing the good which is ultimately found in God. All other creatures act in accord with the nature God gave them. Yet we are capable of far more, and are created to do far more thanks to the divine image within us.

But this is not the only way we can find God in the human person. Our Blessed Lord teaches us to see Himself in every person: "Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brethren, you did it to me." (Mt. 25:40) Through the Incarnation, God takes our humanity to Himself, so that it may be elevated beyond the natural image of God into a supernatural image. Each person we encounter is a lesser version of Christ. Each one of them reflects to us the Savior who came to save us from sin. Each one is an opportunity to live the two great commandments: to love God completely and to love our neighbor as ourself.

We may not know the circumstances that have led any random person into our life, but we must strive to see Christ in them. Remember that our Lord even commands us to love our enemies. Behold the Christ in your midst. Do not ignore Him or reject Him, but love Him in those



around us, especially the poor. Let us seek to see God present in our lives every day, that we may be made worthy to truly see Him face to face in eternal glory.
