FROM THE PRIEST – CONFESSION & IT'S NECESSITY

We continue down the path to Lent as we move through these days. In the traditional liturgical calendar, the 2 1/2 weeks before Lent are called Septuagesimatide, symbolic of the 70 days before Easter (70 in Latin is *Septuagesima*, hence the name of the season). This period normally saw the beginning of violet vestments at Mass and the elimination of the Alleluia in the divine liturgy. Though this may not be done in the ordinary Mass we know today, it is still important for us to prepare well to have a holy Lent.

We saw last week about the necessity of penance in the life of the Christian, and we will see today and next week about how we can do that in various practices meant to be done during Lent. Penances are practices done as means of overcoming our sins and expressing our change of heart, from the old ways of the world, the flesh, and the devil, onto the way of Jesus Christ. Yet these actions of contrition and penance cannot compete with the sacrament that our blessed Lord Himself gave His Apostles and the Church in the sacrament of confession.

Jesus Christ gave to us through the Church the seven sacraments as visible signs of His grace and mercy poured out upon us to aid us in becoming the saints we were created to be. The sacrament which perceptibly wipes away all our sins committed post-baptism is the sacrament of confession or the sacrament of penance. In this sacrament, one comes before God through the person of the priest, acknowledges their sins, and hears the words of absolution which remove all confessed sins from your soul. This is how the Church helps remove or maintain the sins of the people of God as Jesus gave the clergy the authority to do (cf. John 20:22-23).

This sacrament is the ordinary means we have to be freed of any and all of our sins. The Protestants are wrong and teach falsely when they try to claim that we do not need confession. On the contrary, we are called by Christ to confess our guilt and our contrition in order to be healed and to become what we are supposed to be. It is only in receiving confession on a frequent basis (at least once a month) that we can even begin to be freed of sin which holds us back from God or even destroys our relationship with God, let alone our growth in Christ.

The Church actually mandates that we go to confession at least once a year to confess serious sins (see Code of Canon Law canon 989). Even if we have not knowingly committed serious or mortal sins, confession is the only way we have to know that God has forgiven us of our sins. St. Philip Neri recommends confession to grow as a saint: "When we go to confession, we should accuse ourselves of our worst sins first, and of those things which we are most ashamed of, because by this means we put the devil to greater confusion, and reap more fruit from our confession." Let us not avoid this wondrous sacrament, but let us be resolved to receive God's mercy and grace and become better and holier than before.
