

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK—MANIFESTATIONS OF GOD: THE SACRED LITURGY

How does God come and manifest Himself to us? We can read in the Bible of multiple occasions where the Almighty appears before one of the various patriarchs: from Abraham and the 3 travelers to Moses and the burning bush and Elijah in the still, small voice, multiple theophanies occur which can seem so far-fetched in our modern age. How do I encounter God now?

We must understand that Christ Himself has given us a means of encountering God on a regular basis, if only we know and see with the eyes of faith what is happening. This mystical manifestation happens through the sacred liturgy of the Church. The Mass is not primarily a gathering focused upon the community, but the worship of the Most Holy Trinity-to the Father through the Son in the Holy Spirit. This means that God is manifested before us when we are at Mass.

We may say that this is obvious because the Eucharist is made present, and isn't the Eucharist the Real Presence of Jesus? Yet this is only the peak of God manifesting Himself to us. The entire sacred liturgy is done so that we may encounter Him in the still, small voice of the Church at prayer. But we must see what is happening and to Whom it is pointing or symbolizing for us.

The priest himself is a sign of Christ the Bridegroom drawing to His Bride the Church as well as Christ the High Priest offering the one perfect sacrifice of the Cross for our redemption from sin and our salvation into eternal life. The church building is meant to point us upward and outward to the God who transcends all time and space yet humbles Himself to come down to our little corner of the universe. The altar reminds us of Christ who is the true Altar upon which sacrifice, holocausts, and prayers are offered up to God from man. The tabernacle contains the living Christ



hidden under the Eucharist, with the lamp light burning brightly to remind us of His continual presence with us. And this is not to mention the prayers, readings, and actions which occur within the Mass!

How can we say God is not near to us if we have all of this? But we must see with the eyes of faith. We must recall and recognize Christ the manifestation of God is near to us when we are at Mass. The words of St. John Vianney say it best: "If we really understood the Mass, we would die of joy." Pray for the grace to encounter God through the Mass, and see Him come to you so that you may know that He is close. Do not have hearts of doubt, but see in faith God in Christ drawing near to us and calling us to Himself. May we worship God more fully so that we may be readied to worship Him forever in eternal life.
