FROM THE PASTOR – ON THE SUNDAY OBLIGATION

With summer arriving, this is the time for vacations as well as some relaxation in the coming heat. The question often arises during this time: how obligated are we to attend Mass on Sundays? Are there any legitimate reasons why we cannot attend? Can we substitute something for the Mass?

Holy Mother Church obliges us to attend Mass on Sundays in order to fulfill the first great commandment Jesus gave us: to love God. This is highlighted for us also in the Ten Commandments where God commands the Israelites to honor the Sabbath. For the ancient Israelites (and even Jews today), this was done on Saturday. The Church moved this obligation to Sunday in honor of the Resurrection, the sign of Christ's victory over our enemies. Christians have worshipped on Sunday since then, as can be witnessed from the Church Fathers (especially St. Justin Martyr). It has only been in the last few decades that this obligation has been extended to attending Mass on Saturday evening, though Sunday is still the main day of celebration and obligation.

But can there be a valid reason which excuses us from attending Sunday Mass? There have only been two valid categories of reasons offered in the eyes of moralists throughout the centuries.

- 1) Sickness or Infirmity—either because we are sick or we are caring for those who are sick or infirm (this includes homebound elderly and even babies).
- 2) Inability to Attend—we are unable to go to Mass either because we are inaccessible (weather, emergencies, great distances to travel [usually over an hour's journey one way]) or no Mass is offered (for example, when our parish was closed for public worship during the lockdowns)

These are the only reasons which legitimately excuse us from the Sunday obligation. Everything else is a distraction from our duty to God. We are bound by the Church and by our profession as Christians to worship as a community on Sunday in order to give to God what we owe Him: adoration, praise, thanksgiving, worship, ultimately everything. If we make something more important than the Sunday Mass, then we are demonstrating what we truly worship.

What ought we to do if we cannot attend Sunday Mass for a legitimate reason? First, if you will have a temporary inability to attend, you can discuss the matter with me and I could grant you an individual dispensation on a case by case basis. Pastors have the right to do this for a just cause, so please discuss this with me if this matter comes up. Second, we should still consecrate the day with some prayer and rest from serious labors. We can watch Mass on the TV (although this does not fulfill our obligation), we could pray some prayers including the Rosary, and we can rest in the work which God is still doing through us.

May you not see this as a burden but a means to loving God and rejoicing with Him now & forever! *Fr. Jacob Straub*
