FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK—CONTRITION

Lent is a time to consider our sinfulness and our need to repent. This should lead us to come to the sacrament of confession and receive the mercy of God. Yet we cannot do this without contrition. What is contrition?

The recent Catechism defines contrition as "sorrow of the soul and hatred for the sin committed, together with a resolution not to sin again." We get the word "contrition" from the Latin *contritio*—a grinding or breaking down of something. This is correct in that we are grinding down our sinful self so that we may be filled with Christ. Sin inflates us with pride and error, and we must be broken of these false ideas in order to know and live in Him who is the Way, the Truth, and the Life. We cannot grow as Christians unless we are sorry for the sins we have committed and resolved to move away from them and closer to God.

This is why the priest asks us to make an act of contrition during confession: it is an expression of this sorrow. We should not make this act in a rote manner, just reciting it from memory to get through. The act of contrition is how we express our sorrow and our repentance for sin. If we do not mean it, then we are hypocrites and we negate our confession. Yes, I wrote that correctly: if we are not sorry for our sins and are not resolved to avoid sin, then we have not been forgiven and we are still unclean before God.

There are two types of contrition possible. The first is *perfect* contrition, which means we are perfectly sorry and contrite because we have offended God who is all good and deserving of all our love (sound familiar?). It is perfect because it is not lacking in any way or distracted from our primary purpose in life-to know, love, and serve God. The other is *imperfect* contrition, which sees us sorry for any lesser reason such as avoiding Hell, desiring eternal life, hating sin, etc. While this is not what God fully desires, He can still forgive us so that by His grace we may grow in contrition.

No matter what, let us be sorry for our grievous offenses against God and ask Him to have mercy on us, that we may not be lost forever, but converted and live. *Fr. Jacob Straub*

CHURCH RULES FOR LENTEN FASTING & ABSTINENCE

FASTING – ASH WEDNESDAY & GOOD FRIDAY

Must be done by all aged 18-59; one main meal; two other lesser meals may be consumed which must not equal as much as one main meal; liquids permitted

ABSTINENCE - ASH WEDNESDAY & ALL FRIDAYS OF LENT

Must be done by all who are at least 14 years old; no consumption of flesh meat (beef, pork, chicken, etc.); seafood (fish, shrimp, shellfish, etc.) permitted

Other circumstances may merit a dispensation from these rules (pregnancy, disease, etc); please talk with Fr. Straub if you have any issues or questions or would like a dispensation from these rules.
