FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK—AMENDMENT OF LIFE

We cannot discuss contrition of the repentant sinner without discussing the last yet most vital aspect of this penitential action: amendment of life. It is absolute folly to continue down the same path when one realizes it leads to a deadly fall; so too is it folly to continue to live the same way when we realize it keeps leading to sin and to eternal death. We must change our ways if we are truly sorry for our sins and desirous of avoiding repeated or even further sin.

We must first eliminate the sources of sin. Remember the word of the Lord: "If your right eye causes you to sin, pluck it out and throw it away; it is better that you lose one of your members than that your whole body be thrown into hell." (Matthew 5:29) The Church Fathers always saw this statement as a metaphor for the removal of whatever causes our fall. This can be media or access to that media (a common root for sins such as pornography and lust). This can be any item which induces temptation. But this can also be people as well. Is it really worth maintaining a friendship that does not elevate us but causes us to fall to damnation?

We ought to replace these sources of sin with holy items. Which would actually help us grow more in Christ: the television as the center of our living room or the crucifix? Which should see more usage: the smartphone or the bible? Is it better to collect things which we cannot keep forever or to live simply and give without thought? We may not be called to monastic poverty, but we could live simpler lives preparing for the riches of Heaven.

Above all, we must replace our sinful actions with the virtuous and holy. We cannot live as if everything is fine and God's mercy will do the rest. While His mercy is deep and profound, we must do our part to desire holiness and eternal life. Again from Christ Himself: "the gate is narrow and the way is hard, that leads to life, and those who find it are few." (Matthew 7:14) What excuse will you present when the Just Judge enumerates so many sins and asks "Did you truly love Me?" It is never too late to ask for pardon, but we cannot continue full steam ahead on the path of destruction. Receive the mercy of the Crucified Lord, and do as He commands: "Go and sin no more."

CHURCH RULES FOR LENTEN FASTING & ABSTINENCE

FASTING – ASH WEDNESDAY & GOOD FRIDAY

Must be done by all aged 18-59; one main meal; two other lesser meals may be consumed which must not equal as much as one main meal; liquids permitted

ABSTINENCE - ASH WEDNESDAY & ALL FRIDAYS OF LENT

Must be done by all who are at least 14 years old; no consumption of flesh meat (beef, pork, chicken, etc.); seafood (fish, shrimp, shellfish, etc.) permitted

Other circumstances may merit a dispensation from these rules (pregnancy, disease, etc); please talk with Fr. Straub if you have any issues or questions or would like a dispensation from these rules.
