





# FROM THE PASTOR—FUNERALS: MASSES FOR THE DEAD

In considering end of life matters, we usually think of the preparation for the funeral and the burial of the body. But what about after that day? What happens after we are buried in the ground? Is that all we can do for the dead? On the contrary: it should only be the beginning of our concern for our loved ones after death. We are all obliged as part of the spiritual works of mercy to pray for the dead, and that not only includes our personal prayers but must include the offering of Masses for our beloved dead.



As we discussed last week in seeing the merit and value of the Mass over a funeral service: The Mass is the re-offering of the sacrifice of Calvary through Christ the High Priest. The Mass is of infinite value, therefore, since it is not the work of men but the work of the God -man, whose every action is a divine action. Nothing we plan out and do ourselves can ever equal the Mass.

Though every Mass has the general intention of the glorification and worship of God as well as the sanctification of souls, we can apply a specific intention to each Mass. You should note the weekly Masses offered not only at our parish but every Catholic church usually have a specific intention for which that Mass is applied. It is usually done on behalf of someone who is deceased, though we can apply it to the living as well. We ought to not only offer some Masses for our beloved dead, but have some offered for us when we have gone to our eternal reward.

Two traditional practices for Mass intentions should be done. The first is the month's mind having a Mass offered 30 days (or generally one month) after the funeral and burial. This was done to offer a formal close to the period of mourning and grief over the recently deceased. The other is to offer a series of Gregorian Masses. This comes from a practice documented by Pope St. Gregory the Great in the late 6th century of a soul being freed from Purgatory after 33 consecutive Masses were offered for the soul. These Gregorian Masses are hard to do in parishes which have many obligations, but religious orders can usually do it. If you want some information, please feel free to ask me how these can be arranged. As you make your final preparations, be sure that some Masses will be said for you beyond your burial day. Do not presume that you will go straight to Heaven, but be aided by all the prayers and graces you need to make it through Purgatory and be worthy to rejoice with Christ the King in eternity. *Fr.
