

## FROM THE PASTOR—CURRENT ISSUES: TRANSGENDERISM

The hottest topic right now in society is the transgender and gender identity movement. This used to entail merely identifying as the opposite gender, whether cross-dressing or having total reconstructive surgery to "become" that gender. But now this movement has expanded beyond the two basic genders. Many now see a more "fluid" or "nonbinary" model of gender and seek to identify themselves outside of the "restrictive old constructs". This is where the question of pronouns comes into play: it goes above a man calling himself a woman or vice versa but an individual establishing the pronouns that "properly" identify them at that moment. Hence why we see such outrageous choices like she/they, xe/xim, or whatever they feel it to be in the moment.

We must identify in this movement its first major component: a sign of the growing mental disorder of our society. The same people who will profess absolute confidence and belief in science are often the same people who will declare there are more than 2 genders. The fact that someone feels "uncomfortable" in their body and needs to redefine themselves shows an immense psychological disorder which ought to be treated, not accepted. What is worse is that people think it is fine to subject children of all ages to this treatment, even to give them drugs to block their hormones in the middle of puberty and perform surgeries on them to make them their desired gender. We don't even let these kids vote but they can make this lifechanging decision at such a young age?

Beyond the psychological or mental issues associated with this movement is the denial of the basic reality of the human person created by God. We are not flesh-trapped souls waiting to be freed from the prison of physicality; a human person is both body and soul. In the Nicene Creed we pray every Sunday and holy day, we profess "I look forward to the resurrection of the dead". We shall not remain as souls after death, but shall rise to our full constitution at the Last Day just as Jesus rose from the dead on Easter Sunday. We do not become angels (though we may be like them, as last week's Gospel taught) but shall be human beings forever.

This means that we cannot separate our gender from our identity, nor can we define ourselves as something other than or different from our bodies. It also means that our gender is more than just our bodies but is also an integral part of our humanity. Our gender identity does not merely exist in the body but in our soul as well. Men are men in all of their parts and women are women in all of their parts. No matter what clothing you wear or whatever surgery you undergo, you can never change this fundamental part of yourself. You are what God has created you to be.

Let us pray for the people who are suffering from this disorder, especially children susceptible to pressure from peers as well as adults. Let us affirm the goodness of the body as well as our total humanity, so that we many embrace the I which God has created and seek to return this same I to Him in thanksgiving for the gift of life and the gift of salvation. *Fr.
