### FROM THE PASTOR—CURRENT ISSUES: CHURCH AND STATE

Modern Americans seem to be very oxymoronic when it comes to government: they will decry the increase of its presence in their lives while voting for those who advocate for greater governmental activity and at times even demand it. We cannot make up our minds as to how much government is too much or how wide the scope of regulation should be. How much should government be involved in schooling or food production or labor rights or healthcare? Yet the trend has been to increase government control and regulation in all areas, and this is not a healthy sign for our society.

Wherever the state intrudes, it is more often than not in the interests only of the state and in particular of those in power. We see this happen in a variety of manners in our own nation, from corn ethanol subsidies for the benefit of conservative farmers to the legalization of homosexual "marriage" for liberal donors. As consensus over morality and the direction of society disintegrates, the state becomes the means of imposing one's culture upon all subjects. This idea is not new at all in history: the will of the king is usually meant to be the will of the people in monarchies. However, our broken system continues to benefit those hungry for power and domination rather than those who seek to serve God and country.

With the loss of a common belief comes the need for something to occupy the vacuum left behind. The state will naturally seek to replace and dominate all because men love to rule others rather than rule themselves. How many people do we know who look only to government for any concept of right or wrong, good or evil? Yet our country is not founded on actual Christian principles, despite the number of Founding Fathers who professed some form of Christianity. The United States is meant to be neutral, but this is ultimately an untenable position.



There can be no neutrality in morality just as there can be no neutrality in religion. As Catholics, we believe that our faith is the fullness of truth and that Christ should be the light by which all things are illuminated, including the state. It is not the Church which serves the state but ought to be reversed: all things in the service of the King of Kings and Lord of Lords. Our first loyalty is not to a president, but the King.

Let us strive to live our lives subject to Christ the King in every way. Let us be vigilant in serving Him in all that we do, and eager to draw others to His throne. Let us pray for a conversion of this country away from godlessness towards the truth which shall be fully revealed on the Last Day: nothing is beyond His reach, and all shall be under Him forever. *Fr.
