

FROM THE PASTOR—CURRENT ISSUES: POLITICS & VOTING

Returning to my series on current issues, and we should focus on one which is necessary to prepare for as Election Day is in a few days. I doubt I would stir waves by saying that it seems that politics has gone off the rocker in recent years. One reason I don't watch regular TV is so I don't have to be bombarded by political ads, but I still see them even watching something on my phone or computer. If you think that is crazy, you should see social media and the frenetic screes from both sides: liberals saying this election is for either "democracy or fascism" and conservatives pushing their candidates as the savior of the nation. It really is too much.

What is our part to play in politics as Catholics? We cannot remain on the sidelines but must be active in converting the world, and that includes nations. Traditionally we sought the conversion of kings as a means of converting entire peoples, but now we must seek to work within current political systems to help Christ reign supreme. We have a duty to promote and elect leaders whose policies are consistent with our Catholic faith. No Catholic may openly support a candidate or politician with anti-Catholic positions such as abortion, contraception and the alphabet agenda.

However, it is very frustrating to see that very little seems to change in Washington. We seem to be only capable of choosing Republicans as Democrats increase their drive for an anti-life, anti-marriage, and anti-family agenda, yet too often these Republicans fail us. We can also be fed up with so many remaining in office for so long and being more concerned with their own welfare rather than their constituents. It is of course a sign of the decline of our age that our governments fail and there seems nowhere to turn in these dark days, but we must not lose hope in God.

While we can exercise a right to vote in this country, we should try to exercise it. Reiterating the principle that we cannot support candidates who support moral evils, we are permitted to excuse ourselves from voting in certain races because we do not trust any of the candidates. One should never vote because one needs to, but because one has the moral certitude that the candidate chosen is most consistent with our beliefs. Besides, there are quite a few local races which we should invest more time and energy into deciding than only the federal races. One instance would be the family court judge positions. These positions need good people to be there to support families and children at vulnerable times. Be informed and vote for the best candidate there as well as the major races.

While we will probably not fix everything with this election, we have an opportunity to influence our government in favor of Christ and His Church. Let us pray for the upcoming election and in particular for the success of amendment #2, so that we may be a truly pro-life state. May God help our country to become more united to Him and ruled by Him each day so that all may flourish under the kingship of Christ in this life and in eternal life.
