

FROM THE PASTOR—SACRAMENTALS: ST. BENEDICT MEDAL

Many of the sacramental devotional medals made throughout the centuries have been attached to religious orders. These items serve as an aid to the consecrated religious who seeks protection against temptation and sin as well as blessings and graces from God and Our Lady. It is no different with the medal used by most Benedictine monasteries today known as Saint Benedict's Medal.

The origin of this medal is not well known but attested to as early as the 15th century. You will see a picture of the two sides of the medal below. The middle figure on the left (front) is an image of Saint Benedict of Nursia. This holy monk is considered the founder of western monasticism thanks to his own example of living separate from the world as well as the rule he wrote in the 5th century for his monks to follow. In fact, you can see him holding a copy of the rule in his left hand, which he desires all who ascribe to be his spiritual children to follow. You can also note a



raven beneath the rule, from the story of a raven bringing bread to the holy monk when he was a hermit, living alone in a cave in modern Italy before others found him and wanted to follow his example.

The right (reverse) side shows a cross and lots of letters. All of these initials come from Latin terms. The CSPB stands for "Cross of our father Benedict" which has come to be called the Benedictine cross. At the top is the word "PAX" which is the Lat-

in word for "peace". All the other letters stand for prayers of exorcism against the demons so as to protect the wearer from spiritual harm.

This medal is a powerful agent against demonic activity. The particular blessing given for this medal seems almost like an exorcism ritual. The medal has been used to bless and protect homes in a few ways, such as placing a medal over a door or on windowsills. The medal serves also to recognize one who has joined themselves to the spiritual rule and rigor of the Benedictines. While not all of us are called to enter the monastery, one is able to become an oblate at most monasteries and partake of some aspects of the rule and life of the monastery while still in the world. These oblates normally wear this medal as a sign of their union with the monks and nuns who pray and labor for the salvation of souls while being removed from the world.

Feel free to ask me to bless any of your Saint Benedict medals properly so that you may grow in single-minded pursuit of Christ just as the holy monk did and inspired numerous others to do so even to today. Use these sacramentals well for your protection and your pursuit of eternity.
