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

FROM THE PASTOR—SACRAMENTALS: THE CRUCIFIX

It seems appropriate to begin this month in which we celebrate the Exaltation of the Holy Cross (feast on Sept. 14) by continuing our sacramentals articles by looking at the use of crucifixes. We began this series looking at the Sign of the Cross which is an action that we do upon our person. But we as human beings desire images to help facilitate our thoughts along with serving as reminders and indicators of those things important and necessary to us.

As the Roman Empire was converted to the Catholic faith and cruel punishments such as crucifixion began to disappear, fewer and fewer people actually saw a person crucified in their everyday lives. The Church began to see the prudence of displaying an image of Christ crucified in the sanctuary as a reminder of all that He suffered because of us and for us. Not only has the image of the crucifix been added to churches for remembrance but as an object of devotion and meditation. Its location at the center of the sanctuary reminds us that whenever we attend and assist at Mass, we are present in a mystical way at the foot of the Cross to behold the depths to which Christ dis-



played His love for us and offered the sacrifice of obedience and propitiation for us.

With the advent of greater production methods and greater wealth came the production of crucifixes not just for churches or religious but for people to have at home as well. This provided a center for the home spiritually as well as providing a constant reminder of Christ for the family. In many Catholic households, the crucifix was the central part of a home al-

tar, at which various statues or icons were placed along with reminders of deceased family members or those who were away.

Every Catholic home should have a crucifix prominently placed within the house. It should not be displayed out of pride but as a means of drawing attention so that one can make it a call to prayer and reflection. It should hold a far more prominent spot in our house than the TV which is only meant for entertainment. Not only should you work to get one but be sure to have it blessed so that it may truly be connected to God. Let us never shy away from the gaze of the crucifix but hold Christ crucified ever near to us.
